Pursuant to section 8 of the Continental Shelf Act 1964, Her Excellency the Governor-General, acting on the advice and with the consent of the Executive Council, makes the following regulations.

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Regulations

- 1 Title**
These regulations are the Continental Shelf (Pohokura Platform B Safety Zone) Regulations 2006.
- 2 Commencement**
These regulations come into force on 2 March 2006.
- 3 Interpretation**
In these regulations,—
installation means the platform Pohokura Platform B situated over the position 38°54'42.9"S 174°16'15.4"E
safety zone means the safety zone established by regulation 4
ship has the same meaning as in the Maritime Transport Act 1994.
- 4 Safety zone established**
A safety zone extends from each point of the outer edge of the installation to a distance of 500 m.
- 5 Entry of ships prohibited**
A ship must not enter the safety zone unless it is engaged in constructing or servicing the installation, submarine pipelines, or associated offshore facilities.
- 6 Offence**
(1) Every person who is for the time being in charge of a ship that enters the safety zone in contravention of regulation 5 commits an offence.
(2) Every person who commits an offence against subclause (1) is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$1,000.

7 Defence

It is a defence to a prosecution for an offence against regulation 6(1) if the ship's entry into the safety zone was—

- (a) to secure the safety of the ship in an emergency, whether or not caused by stress of weather; or
- (b) to save, or prevent danger to, human life or a ship in distress; or
- (c) compelled by an event or circumstance beyond the control of the person for the time being in charge of the ship.

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Notes**1 General**

2 Status of reprints

Under section 16D of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, reprints are presumed to correctly state, as at the date of the reprint, the law enacted by the principal enactment and by the amendments to that enactment. This presumption applies even though editorial changes authorised by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 have been made in the reprint.

This presumption may be rebutted by producing the official volumes of statutes or statutory regulations in which the principal enactment and its amendments are contained.

3 How reprints are prepared

A number of editorial conventions are followed in the preparation of reprints. For example, the enacting words are not included in Acts, and provisions that are repealed or revoked

4 *Changes made under section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989*

Section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 authorises the making of editorial changes in a reprint as set out in sections 17D and 17E of that Act so that, to the extent permitted, the format and style of the reprinted enactment is consistent with current legislative drafting practice. Changes that would alter the effect of the legislation are not permitted. A new format of legislation was introduced on 1 January 2000. Changes to legislative drafting style have also been made since 1997, and are ongoing. To the extent permitted by section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989, all legislation reprinted after 1 January 2000 is in the new format for legislation and reflects current drafting practice at the time of the reprint.

In outline, the editorial changes made in reprints under the authority of section 17C of the Acts and Regulations Publication Act 1989 are set out below, and they have been applied, where relevant, in the preparation of this reprint:

- omission of unnecessary referential words (such as “of this section” and “of this Act”)
- typeface and type size (Times Roman, generally in 11.5 point)
- layout of provisions, including:
 - indentation
 - position of section headings (eg, the number and heading now appear above the section)
- format of definitions (eg, the defined term now appears in bold type, without quotation marks)
- format of dates (eg, a date formerly expressed as “the 1st day of January 1999” is now expressed as “1 January 1999”)

- position of the date of assent (it now appears on the front page of each Act)
- punctuation (eg, colons are not used after definitions)
- Parts numbered with roman numerals are replaced with arabic numerals, and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- case and appearance of letters and words, including:
 - format of headings (eg, headings where each word formerly appeared with an initial capital letter followed by small capital letters are amended so that the heading appears in bold, with only the first word (and any proper nouns) appearing with an initial capital letter)
 - small capital letters in section and subsection references are now capital letters
- schedules are renumbered (eg, Schedule 1 replaces First Schedule), and all cross-references are changed accordingly
- running heads (the information that appears at the top of each page)
- format of two-column schedules of consequential amendments, and schedules of repeals (eg, they are rearranged into alphabetical order, rather than chronological).
